
Country Scandal: A Play by Platonov, Translated by Dover Thrift Editions



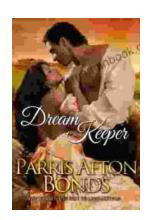

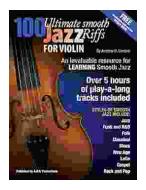
