

Worshiping With Children Living With Special Educational Needs (SEN): Four Common Misunderstandings

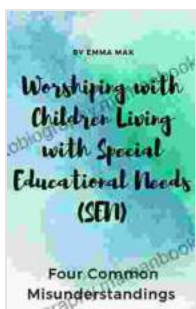

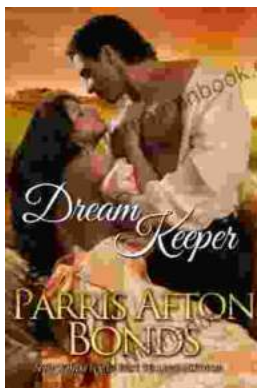
